CHAPTER 34

[Engrossed Senate Bill No: 394]

WASHINGTON STATE COMMISSION ON MEXICAN-AMERICAN AFFAIRS

An ACT Relating to state government; and establishing the Washington commission on Mexican-American affairs.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

NEW SECTION. Section 1. The legislature declares that the public policy of this state is to insure equal opportunity for all of its citizens. The legislature finds that Mexican-Americans and other Spanish speaking Americans have unique and special problems. It is of this act to iaprove the well-being the purpose mexican-Americans and other Spanish speaking Americans by insuring their participation in the fields of government, business, and education. The legislature further finds that it is necessary to aid. Mexican-Americans and other Spanish speaking Americans in obtaining governmental services in order to propote the health, safety and all the residents of this state. Therefore the legislature deems it necessary to create a commission to carry out the purposes of this act.

HEM SECTION. Sec. 2. There is created a Washington state consission on Mexican-Aperican affairs.

HEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) The commission shall consist of eleven nembers appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate. The membership shall include:

- (a) Two members from workers in the agricultural field;
- (b) Two members from the general populace of the Spanish speaking population:
 - (c) Que member from the field of education;
 - (d) One member from professional services; and
 - (e) One member from among elected trade union officials.
- (f) Your member's from the Mexican-American community in the state.
- (2) The members shall hold office commencing July 1, 1971 for four years and until their successors are chosen and qualified. Four of the initial appointees shall be appointed for two-year terms and three shall be appointed for four-year terms. Tacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments.
- (3) Headers shall receive twenty-five dollars per diem for each day or major portion thereof plus reindursement for actual travel expenses incurred in the performance of their duties in the same namer as provided for state officials generally in chapter 43.03 RCW as now or hereafter anended.
- (4) Six members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of conducting business.

전으로 SECTION. Sec. 4. The commission shall:

- (1) Elect one of its members to serve as chairman;
- (2) Appoint a full time executive secretary:
- (3) Appoint a staff who shall be state employees pursuant to
- (4) Adopt rules and regulations pursuant to chapter 34.04 RCM.

 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. (1) The commission shall advise state departments and agencies regarding appropriate action to be taken to help assure that state programs are providing the assistance needed by Hexican-Americans and other Spanish speaking Americans.
- (2) The commission shall further advise such departments and agencies on the development and implementation of comprehensive and coordinated policies, plans, and programs focusing on the special problems and needs of Mexican-Americans and other Spanish speaking Americans.
- (3) Zach state department and agency shall appoint one staff member to an interagency advisory council on mexican-American affairs. The advisory council shall give technical assistance to the commission in order that the commission may carry out the purposes of this act.

Commission may establish such relationships with local governments, and private industry as may be needed to promote equal opportunity.

APPLICATION. Sec. 7. If any provision of this act, or its application to any person or circustance is held invalid, the remainder of the act, or the application of the provision to other paraons or circumstances is not affected.
